- Sweet Corn
 - Corn you eat
 - Corn-on-the-cob, canned corn or frozen corn
 - Less than 1% of corn grown in the U.S.







Popcorn

- Stores water
- When heated, the water builds up pressure
- Explodes into the fluffy white snack we all love









- Field Corn (dent corn)
 - Hard outer portion about the thickness of your fingernail
 - Inner portion is soft and floury
 - 99% of corn grown in the U.S.

Can you guess how many kernels are on one ear of corn?








Answer:

 - Helps it to grow big and strong








Science of Corn
