E15 DEMAND NOW YEAR ROUND



"Despite E15 being approved for 96% of the vehicles on the road today, outdated regulations excluded it from being sold during summer months..."

Growing and protecting corn-based ethanol markets on all fronts is crucial to Missouri Corn's mission. In February, the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) approved a waiver request submitted by Gov. Mike Parson to ensure Show-Me State drivers have year-round access to fuel containing 15 percent ethanol (E15), also known as Unleaded 88. At the urging of corn growers, Gov. Parson joined a coalition of seven other Midwest governors to request a waiver through the Clean Air Act for lower-volatility gasoline during summer months. Smart policy combined with growing infrastructure translates to more choices at the pump, increased corn demand, and stronger energy security.

E85 DEMAND IN CALIFORNIA



"Our infrastructure grant dollars, teamed with Pearson Fuels' marketing and local expertise, allows us to increase ethanol demand faster..."

The Missouri Corn Merchandising Council, along with corn checkoff programs from Kansas, Nebraska, and lowa, are leveraging resources to build ethanol demand in the fastest-growing market for E85 (an 85% ethanol blend). The coalition has partnered with Pearson Fuels, the largest E85 distributor in California, since 2021. And efforts are paying off. Sales of E85 have exploded from just over 40 million gallons in 2020 to a record-setting 118.5 million gallons in 2023. According to California Air Resources Board data, while the state's Low Carbon Fuel Standard incentivizes so-called "zero-emission vehicles" powered by electricity or hydrogen, ethanol has reduced more greenhouse gas emissions than any other fuel.



ETHANOL DEMAND GOING GLOBAL





"You can't underestimate the value of face-to-face conversations with our global customers. When the trade team from India visited our farm, they had a lot of questions about corn farming in Missouri..."

Efforts to expand global ethanol markets are proving effective, thanks to a strong partnership with the U.S. Grains Council. In the 2023 marketing year, ethanol exports to Canada and the United Kingdom reported significant growth of 13% and 147% respectively, with India increasing by an impressive 191%. In 2022, Missouri Corn hosted a trade team from India to provide a closer look at all ethanol components from plant to pump. The delegation was comprised of members from India's automotive manufacturers. oil companies, and the country's Governmental Energy Transition Team. India is working toward an E20 blending target by 2025, and the American corn farmer is helping make that goal possible.
