If you've ever helped your kids put together a jigsaw puzzle, you know it takes patience - turning pieces this way and that, getting each in the correct spot, for everything to fit together just right. Oftentimes, it feels like our work at the Missouri Corn Merchandising Council requires those same skills. Making sure we have all the right pieces in place. Making small tweaks here and there to ensure things line up.

For the last few years, one of the biggest pictures we've tackled is building markets abroad. Many of the growth opportunities for growers have firmly fallen in the global arena. Whether corn, co-products, or ethanol, trade has been key to building demand for corn farmers here at home. To help build relationships and ensure we have all the right pieces, Missouri Corn relies on strong partnerships with the U.S. Grains Council and U.S. Meat Export Federation to provide boots-on-the-ground action in countries all over the world.

To align the pieces, we've invested dollars in Mexico to enhance the efficiency of unloading distillers grains, strategically partnered with facilities in Egypt to improve storage and maintain grain quality, and welcomed trade teams to Missouri farms to showcase U.S. corn production firsthand while strengthening relationships with buyers.

For over a year, one effort has been working alongside our partners at MCGA and the National Corn Growers Association (NCGA) to ensure we don't lose an important piece of the puzzle. With Mexico threatening to ban genetically modified corn and putting our top market in jeopardy – of which nearly 14% originates in Missouri – we leaned on our partners to pick up the policy reins and push back to protect the vital trade agreement.

This victory wasn't just a win for trade agreements—it was a win for every corn grower. It's proof that when we stand together, all the pieces can fall into place to overcome the biggest challenges. 
To grow global market demand, Missouri Corn farmers partner with the U.S. Grains Council (USGC) and the U.S. Meat Export Federation (USMEF) to have boots on the ground in major export markets. Checkoff dollars are matched by government funds, like the USDA's Market Access Program (MAP) and Foreign Market Development (FMD), to support these international market development programs. Working together, Missouri Corn and its partners are building global relationships to increase U.S. exports of corn and corn co-products.





## CORN GROWERS VICTORIOUS IN MEXICO DISPUTE


In a major win for corn growers, an international trade dispute panel ruled Mexico violated the United States-Mexico-Canada Agreement (USMCA) when it issued a decree banning genetically modified corn imports. This victory is a direct result of advocacy efforts by MCGA, NCGA, and other organizations, who have battled the issue since December 2020 when Mexican President Andrés Manuel López Obrador first set off alarms. Given Mexico is the number one export destination for U.S. corn, the ban would have significantly harmed growers and rural communities if left unchecked. The formation of dispute panels is uncommon and must meet a high threshold of requirements, making it no small achievement for corn growers and showcasing the power of an industry working together to build and maintain markets.






### PHILIPPINES MOVES TO E20, HELPING DRIVE U.S. ETHANOL DEMAND

Following the successful implementation of an E10 standard, the Philippines Department of Energy is permitting fuel retailers to sell E20. As one of the world's most progressive ethanol markets, the Philippines consumes 1.8 billion gallons of gasoline annually and imports an average of 75 million gallons of ethanol from the U.S. each year. More than 60 countries have positive ethanol policies in place – a number that continues to grow thanks to the environmental, human health, and economic benefits of ethanol.



### FEDERAL INITIATIVE BOOSTS GLOBAL CORN AND ETHANOL MARKETS

Expanding checkoff investments, the U.S. Department of Agriculture announced plans in October 2023 to create the Regional Agriculture Promotion Program (RAPP) – a \$1.3 billion program to assist in marketing commodities overseas. Like the Agricultural Trade Promotion (ATP) funds first distributed in 2019, RAPP funding supplements MAP and FMD funds the U.S. Grains Council and U.S. Meat Export Federation utilize to help expand markets for corn and corn co-products. Missouri Corn advocated for this long-term investment to aggressively promote U.S. corn worldwide.


### ETHANOL PUMP PROJECT PAYS BIG DIVIDENDS

Missouri Corn, state corn checkoff partners, and the National Corn Growers Association (NCGA) are working with the two largest fuel dispenser manufacturers to produce hardware certified to deliver fuel containing up to 25% and 40% ethanol. To date, the partnership has generated over 82,500 fueling dispensers sold in the North American market certified to deliver at least E25 (~6,000 of these are certified for E40).

### FUNDING SECURED FOR ETHANOL INFRASTRUCTURE IN MISSOURI

At the state level, funding for the Biofuel Infrastructure Incentive Program (BIIP) made it through a tough legislative session thanks to the work of MCGA advocates. This program assists in the distribution and use of biofuels across the state. It enables fuel retailers to upgrade infrastructure to accommodate higher ethanol blends – ultimately increasing availability and options for consumers at the pump. Given the challenges of the 2024 legislative session, successfully securing BIIP funding is a testament to the value Missouri agriculture brings to the state's economy and the power of grassroots involvement.

# WHATWILL DRIVE MORE

The profitability equation of the last two decades has been driven in part by increased ethanol demand. Passage of the Renewable Fuel Standard in 2005 and the Renewable Fuel Standard II (RFS II) in 2007 set an ethanol usage goal of 15 billion gallons by 2015. Now, the growth of the ethanol industry has not only reached the end of the RFS II lifetime but is also being blocked by a de facto electric vehicle edict from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA).

Missouri Corn is working diligently with local, state, and federal partners to support a national octane standard. This federal legislation would establish a new certification fuel for all vehicles that must meet efficiency and greenhouse gas emissions standards. Ethanol is the lowest-cost fuel available in the market today that meets both standards. Passage of a nationwide octane standard provides market certainty for auto manufacturers, fuel retailers, ethanol plants, and corn growers and stops EPA's and NHTSA's rulemakings that force the purchase of electric vehicles.

### EDUCATING POLICYMAKERS IN WASHINGTON, D.C.

Missouri Corn is partnering with other states and NCGA to communicate ethanol's benefits with decision-makers in D.C. The focus is ensuring the right messages reach the right audiences at the right time through social media and search engine keyword targeting. Compelling images and strong messaging work to share the story of how farmers are advancing innovation, sustainability, and economic growth across America with policy-makers, regulators, and staff crafting policies and rules impacting your bottom line.

#### ADVOCATING FOR ACCESS TO INPUTS

Missouri Corn, through the Triazine Network, is proactively engaged with government agencies – including EPA, USDA, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, and the National Marine Fisheries Service – to help protect corn farmers' ability to operate with full access to crop protection products. As the EPA moves forward with its strategy for the court-ordered Endangered Species Act (ESA) compliance for herbicides (like atrazine and glyphosate), MCGA continues to seek solutions to the challenges growers could face in meeting ESA obligations required by law.





### END-OF-YEAR VICTORIES, FARM BILL EFFORTS CONTINUE

Amid a whirlwind of year-end activity, corn growers helped secure a hard-fought victory when Congress passed the American Relief Act of 2025. The bill, which kept the federal government operating through March 14, 2025, included market relief assistance, weather-related disaster support, and a one-year extension of the 2018 Farm Bill.

The market relief assistance allocated \$10 billion for one-time emergency relief to eligible commodity producers, including corn farmers. Calculations will be made based on acres planted to eligible commodities and 50% of all prevented plant acreage during the 2024 crop year. The law stipulates that USDA has until March 21, 2025, to implement the program.

The American Relief Act also included support for Missouri corn growers who experienced crop losses due to qualifying natural disaster events occurring in 2023 and 2024. As with prior disaster assistance, it will take several months for USDA to



announce eligibility and qualification guidelines. MCGA will be monitoring implementation and weighing in as necessary every step of the way.

MCGA continues to work hard to ensure Missouri's congressional leaders understand the value the farm bill provides to farmers, rural communities, and the entire country.






